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## FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK



The Annual Report of the Lokopriya Gopinath Bordoloi Regional Institute of Mental Health (LGBRIMH) for the period 1<sup>st</sup> April, 2018 to 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2019 is presented herewith. LGBRIMH has a long history of reaching out its services to the persons with mental illness and their families from the northeastern region of India. We also have been actively engaged with several community mental health services and have been constantly striving to improve and provide newer services to persons with mental illness and their caregivers. This Annual Report depicts the performance of the Institute in all spheres of its activity. It centers on the various Services, Academic Training and Research undertaken, along with the financial implications arising from it.

With the regional mandate of providing mental health services, LGBRIMH is not only meeting the needs of those from the region but from the neighboring states and countries as well. The demand for mental health services from this institute is growing each year. Having inaugurated the new infrastructure this year, mental health services in the new hospital building is functional. The transition from a closed ward system to an open ward system has had its challenges but all the departments in the Institute have made efforts to meet these challenges with the best of their abilities.

LGBRIMH for over a decade or so, has been ensuring that human resource is developed along with the hospital services. The academic wings of this Institute have been engaged in training mental health professionals in the disciplines of Psychiatry, Psychiatric Nursing, Psychiatric Social Work and Clinical Psychology. The current strength of the students at the Institute has grown from 2 in 2001 to 90 students during this year. The Institute has further taken a step in starting the Digital Certificate Courses for two months duration for Psychiatry, Psychiatric Nursing, Psychiatric Social Work and Clinical Psychology from March 2019.

An important milestone for the Institute was the handing over and occupation of the new Hospital Complex, Nurses Hostel and the Auditorium.

The Department of Psychiatric Social Work was a collaborator with Assam Don Bosco University, Guwahati, for a National Seminar on Mental Health and Social Work Practice from 27<sup>th</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup> April, 2018. The Institute

was the venue for the organization of the Annual Conference of Assam Branch of Indian Psychiatric Society in 20<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> September, 2018. The conference was organized by the Department of Psychiatry. The Institute also witnessed the National Level Annual Conference of the Indian Society of Psychiatric Nurses from 15<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> February, 2019. The conference was organized under the leadership of Department of Psychiatric Nursing with active support from all the departments of Psychiatric Social Work, Clinical Psychology and Psychiatry. All the departments got together to celebrate the World Mental Health Day, 2018 with a month long programs with varied community mental health initiatives. The Department of Psychiatric Social Work also organized a one day seminar on the World Social Work Day, 2019. LGBRIMH has also focusing on the youth with the establishment of a Youth Wellness Hub under the aegis of the Department of Clinical Psychology. The Institute is also actively involved in the *Swachh Bharat Abhiyan*.

It has always been the institute's endeavour to stay close to the stake holders and to be connected to the professional and governmental systems in the society. In an effort to reach to the public at large and to provide a space to express the institute's developments, views and creativity, a bilingual newsletter in English and Assamese will be released soon. Further to provide a professional platform for the faculty and staff to communicate their work. Planning for publication of a scientific journal also in the process. On the anvil is the plan to establish child mental health services and a youth and family resource centre for better service and outreach services.

The achievements of the Institute have been possible only because of the dedicated staff of LGBRIMH. The goals set up every year have been achieved only due to their diligent and sincere efforts. I thank all the Officers of the Administration, Faculty and Staff members of Departments of Psychiatry, Psychiatric Nursing, Psychiatric Social Work, Clinical Psychology, Pathology, Bio-Chemistry and Micro-Biology, Staff of the hospital and the scholars and students of various courses for their consistent and dedicated efforts.

I am also indebted to the Central Ministry, and the various Departments of the Government of India, District Administration, Governmental offices of the State of Assam, civil bodies and the public of Assam for their constant support.

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## LGBRIMH, Tezpur

The Lokopriya Gopinath Bordoloi Regional Institute of Mental Health (LGBRIMH) initially set up as 'Tezpur Lunatic Asylum' under the British Government in April, 1876, completes 142 years of its existence and service in the area of mental health care.

The Institute has been playing an active role in manpower development, service provision and research in the field of mental health and allied sciences. In order to offer specialty care various efforts are being made to establish the Departments of Neurology and Neurosurgery in LGBRIMH, upgrade its services and training and attain the status of an Institute of National Importance.

LGBRIMH has an active outpatient department and an inpatient care facility of 336 beds in the hospital, with free of cost services. Besides this the Institute also conducts regular community based extension programs in and around Tezpur.

The Institute offers regular courses under Gauhati University in M.D. in Psychiatry, M.Sc. in Psychiatric Nursing, M. Phil in Psychiatric Social Work and Clinical Psychology and also a Post-Basic Diploma course in Psychiatric Nursing. In the current session, the Institute admitted the second batch of Ph. D. programme in Psychiatric Social Work and Psychiatric Nursing under Gauhati University and is planning to start Ph. D programme in Clinical Psychology from the next session. The Institute also provides exposure training to visiting students from various medical, para-medical and non-medical institutions.

The Institute has further taken a step in starting the Digital Certificate Courses for two months duration for Psychiatry, Psychiatric Nursing, Psychiatric Social Work and Clinical Psychology from March, 2019.

## **ACADEMIC SECTION**

The Institute is also identified as a centre for providing short-term exposure training in mental health for both medical and non-medical students of educational institutions from different parts of the country.

As is the practice, this year too, the entrance examinations for admission into different affiliated courses were conducted by the Gauhati University through GU-RET Entrance Examination, 2018.

## **DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHIATRY**

#### Introduction:

The Department of Psychiatry was established in 1998 to provide better psychiatric care services and to produce manpower in the field of Psychiatry. MD course in Psychiatry was introduced in 2010 with two seats which was increased to 11 in the year 2018 by MCI.

The trainees are involved in academic activities like seminars, case conferences, journal clubs, short topic discussions and theory classes; and clinical activities like OPD services and ward rounds. All activities are supervised by the faculty and clinical staff of the department.

The faculty and the resident doctors of the Department not only provide services at indoor, outdoor and community extension clinics, but are also engaged in various consultancy activities organised by different governmental and non-governmental organizations.

## DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHIATRIC NURSING

#### Introduction:

The department of Psychiatric Nursing was started in the year 1998 for enhancing professional training in the field of Psychiatric nursing. In view of this, the department is presently running three courses in Psychiatric Nursing, i.e. - Diploma and M.Sc. in Psychiatric Nursing and Ph.D. Diploma in Psychiatric Nursing is a one year course with intake of 30 trainees deputed from all of the eight North Eastern states. M. Sc Nursing (Psychiatric Nursing) is a two year full time course with an intake of 12 students. Ph. D. in Psychiatric Nursing is a full time course with an intake of 2 students. Besides the regular courses, students (i.e. GNM, Post basic B.Sc., B. Sc Nursing, and M.Sc. Nursing) from different institutions of the North Eastern region and other states were posted for clinical exposure training in the Institute under the Department of psychiatric nursing throughout the year. The Department of Psychiatric Nursing conducts various clinical, academic and research activities within as well as outside the institute.

## DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHIATRIC SOCIAL WORK

#### Introduction:

The Department of Psychiatric Social Work came into being with the appointment of a faculty in Psychiatric Social Work in 1998 by the Board of Administration (BoA) under the Govt. of Assam, in pursuance of the recommendations of the Supreme Court orders for up-gradation of the Institute for initiating various services and teaching program in Mental Health at the Institute.

The primary focus for the department then was initiating socially relevant services at the hospital, rehabilitation of long stay patients and planning for various academic training programs in Mental Health including the training of Psychiatric Social Work personnel. The academic training got underway in 2009 with the commencement of M Phil course in Psychiatric Social Work under the affiliation of Gauhati University. The intake capacity for M Phil in Psychiatric Social Work has increased from 2 to 6 seats. The course and curriculum is reviewed periodically by the Committee for Courses and Syllabus under Gauhati University.

The Department has grown to have four (4) faculty members and five (5) Psychiatric Social Workers. The department has twelve (12) M Phil students, inclusive of first and second years. The Department was recognized to start the full-time programme for Ph. D. in October, 2017. The Ph. D. program got underway with three (3) scholars taking admission in the month of October 2017. They were selected through the GURET Examination of Gauhati University. The department also has seven (7) part time Ph. D. scholars under the guidance of the faculty members.

At the clinical front, the department undertakes net-working services and initiatives across the society for the welfare and well-being of persons with mental health problems apart from providing psychosocially oriented clinical services at the Institute. The Department is also actively involved in the reintegration of persons with mental illness who are homeless. The Department offers consultancy services to both governmental and non-governmental sectors.

With impetus from the Ministry towards training a larger number of mental health personnel the Institute launched the Digital courses in Mental Health under the MEET LGBRIMH initiative. The Department of PSW started the online training program on "Mental Health for Social Workers" in the month of March.

#### Academic and other related activities:

- The Academic session for the reporting year (2018-19) witnessed one batch (2016-18) appearing for the final exams in April, 2018. With a change in the academic session, admissions for the new batch took place on 1<sup>st</sup> October, 2018, following selection through the GU-RET entrance examination for M.Phil and Ph.D programmes. It admitted 6 (six) M.Phil students and 3 (three) PhD Scholars.
- The first year batch of M. Phil trainees underwent orientation program for 15 days prior to them being posted into the hospital. Clinical posting during their first year centered mainly in adult psychiatry units and from March, 2019 onwards, the trainees were posted for specialized services of Psychosocial Unit, Family Therapy and Rehabilitation services.
- The second year trainees for M.Phil in Psychiatric Social Work of the batch 2017-19, (admitted on 1st October, 2017), moved into their second year from the month of October, 2018 onwards. They continued their academic programs, research pursuits and clinical posting during the year of report in

Adult Psychiatry, Rehabilitation Services and Family Therapy Centre in the Institute. They also went for exposure training to NIMHANS Bangalore in the month of January, 2019. The second year trainees actively continued their dissertation preparation from November, 2018 onwards.

- Apart from clinical work, lecture programs, seminars, case presentations were held for the trainees by the department. They also attended the unit level academic activities organized by the department of Psychiatry.
- The Ph.D scholars of the batch 2017-20, submitted their six- monthly report to the RAC members in April, 2018. They continued their dual responsibility in the role as supervisors for clinical work.
- Final Examination for M.Phil PSW was held for the 2016-18 batch (session May to April) from 1<sup>st</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> of April, 2018. The results were declared for the batch in May 2018. All 6 trainees cleared the Annual examination of Gauhati University.
- During the year, from May, 2018 onwards, the department coordinated and liaised with the Academic Section for the GU-RET examination of 2018 for M.Phil and a Ph.D course that was scheduled start its session in October, 2018. 3 (Three) seats were declared for the Ph.D entrance examination for the session 2018-19 while 6 (Six) seats were declared for the M.Phil in PSW course.
- Three scholars were admitted as per the selection in the GU-RET, 2018 examinations for the Ph.D program while 6 (six) trainees were selected for the M.Phil clinical course. The new batch of M Phil PSW trainees numbering 6 (six) joined in the month of October, 2018 following the GU-RET conducted by Gauhati University for selection as per UGC 2016 recommendations.
- All Ph.D scholars were posted against the units for clinical and supervisory roles. The newly admitted Ph. D. scholars of batch presented their Ph.D proposal in the month of March, 2019 for approval by Scientific Advisory Committee (SAC) and the Institute Ethics Committee (IEC).
- All the scholars of all batches presented their six monthly progress report to the RAC members in the month of March, 2019.
- The Ph.D scholars (2017-20) and M. Phil trainees (2017-19) presented their progress report in an Inter departmental seminar in the month of March, 2019.

# DEPARTMENT OF CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY

#### Introduction:

The Department of Clinical Psychology was set up in the year 2002. M.Phil. training program in Clinical Psychology (recognized by Rehabilitation Council of India and affiliated to Gauhati University) was introduced in 2011. Since then students from various parts of the country representing states like Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Odisha, Chattisgarh, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand, West Bengal, as well as North Eastern states are being trained to become a mental health professional and practice as clinical psychologist registered with RCI. The department has earned its own name and established itself as a preferred training centre of Clinical Psychology in the Eastern/ North-eastern region. The department has taken initiative to teach students from other states spoken Assamese, in collaboration with a well known local resource centre called Asomiya Club.

The department undertakes teaching assignments for all groups of trainees of the institute. It also caters to students coming for exposure posting from other institutions, especially the post-graduate masters students in psychology/counselling from various states of north eastern region and also other parts of the country.

The services of the Department are currently focused in psycho-diagnostic evaluation, psychotherapy, counselling, child guidance, remedial education for children with special needs, parental counselling and parental education. It is also actively engaged in consultancy and counselling services at schools, colleges and other government and non-government organizations.

The department is equipped with modern diagnostic facilities for patient care services and research activities for the medical students and faculty. BMW management and infection control protocol of the institute ,routine blood examination profile are the active participatory attitude of the department along with shortly introduction of coagulation profile testing, arterial blood gas analysis ,quantitative testing in Microbiology parameters.

#### **Academic Activities:**

The Department conducts classes for M. Phil in Clinical Psychology, M. Sc. Nursing (Psychiatric Nursing) and Medical Laboratory Attendant. The department also conducts training of cleaner staff on collection and disposal of bio-medical waste generated in the institute.

# DEPARTMENT OF BIOCHEMISTRY

#### Introduction:

With the motto of excelling in quality of patient's diagnostic service and teaching activities, the Department of Biochemistry at LGBRIMH was set up in the year 1999. The Department of Biochemistry has been actively engaged in diagnostic part under the Central Laboratory of LGBRIMH. It also imparts teaching activities for the various trainees of the Institute. At present the department has diagnostic facilities for blood sugar estimation, renal function test, liver function test, lipid profile, drug estimation, hormone and electrolyte analysis. Quality of test results are carried out both by daily internal quality control run and involvement in External Quality Control testing time to time. In the tune of involvement in DBT research project for overall improvement, in the past and present, future endeavour of the department lies in improving diagnostic testing quality and introducing latest test parameter in the field of research contemporarily.

# **OUT PATIENT DEPARTMENT**

#### Introduction:

The Out Patient Department of the institute consists of the multidisciplinary team i.e. psychiatrists, clinical psychologists, psychiatric social workers and psychiatric nurses. It also houses the pharmacy, medical record department, a nursing station, laboratory sample collection centre and a canteen. There are five special clinics - Epilepsy & Neurology (Monday), Geriatric (Tuesday), Child & Adolescent (Wednesday and Saturday), Alcohol and Drug Dependence (Thursday) and Psychosomatic Clinic (Friday). The special clinics are held once a week.

#### **OPD Attendance:**

A total of 128897 visits of patients were registered in the OPD from April 2018 to March 2019 which includes 24248 new cases and 104649 old cases. Total new male cases were 12664 and new female cases were 11584 while visits by old male patients and old female patients were 58459 and 46190 respectively during the period.

#### **Annual OPD Attendance:**

There has been a significant increase in the number of patients seeking mental health treatment from the institute which is reflected in the rise in the annual OPD registration of patients during the past years. In 2007, there were only 47,668 patients, including both male and female, visiting the OPD. The total OPD attendance in the last decade indicates a steady increase in the number of patients seeking mental health services.

## **OPD** attendance from various States during 2018-19:

Since its inception, the Institute has been catering to needs of patients from all over the country. During this session the state of Assam has recorded the highest number of patients (126360), followed by Arunachal Pradesh and West Bengal with 902 and 813 patients respectively. There were 284 patients from Nagaland, 102 from Bihar, 124 patients from Meghalaya, 79 from Manipur, 9 from Mizoram, 6 from Sikkim and 30 from Tripura. 15 patients from Nepal also received treatment.

# INDOOR DEPARTMENT

#### Introduction:

The bed strength of the hospital is 336 out of which 246 beds are for males and 90 beds are for females. Out of the total beds, 21 beds (15 male, 6 female) are reserved for patients sent from Jails.

The patients are looked after by a team of mental health professionals, residents, nurses, warders and attendants. The admitted patients get regular patient care services including free medication and check-up, hygienic and nutritious diet, laundered clothes, recreation facilities and other basic amenities. A mini-operation theatre and an ECT facility also function in the Indoor campus. Saloon services are also made available in the Indoor.

The Indoor has provision of visiting room for the guardians and relatives to meet the patients. Counseling services are provided to the guardians during their visits and at the time of discharge of the patient.

## Admission and Discharge during April 2018 - March 2019:

The institute follows the Mental Health Act, 1987 for admission of patients in the indoor. The patients are admitted in the following categories i.e. Voluntary Boarder, Special Circumstances, Reception Order and Jail Case.

A total of 1257 patients were admitted during the current session i. e. April 2018 to March 2019, which included 851 new cases and 406 old cases. Among the new cases 648 were male patients and 203 were female patients. Among the old cases 328 were male patients and 78 were female patients. A total of 1385 number of patients were discharged during the current session among which 916 were new cases and 469 old cases. Among the new cases 691 were male patients and 225 were female patients. Among the old cases 379 were male patients and 90 were female patients.

## **Average Bed Occupancy:**

In the current session, the daily average bed occupancy was **168.09**, while in the previous session (2018-19) it was 238.41.

## **Escape & Death Cases:**

A total of 4 incidents of escape and 1 (at TMCH) incidents of death were recorded during the current session.

## Annual State-wise Admission during April 2018 - March 2019:

During the session 2018-19, there were 1257 admissions. The number of admissions was lesser this session when compared to the number of admissions in the previous session which was 1726 Among 1257 admissions this session, 976 were male patients and 281 were female patients. Out of the total admissions, 1106 patients were from Assam, 71 from Arunachal Pradesh, 24 from Nagaland, 5 from Meghalaya and 3 from Tripura. Apart from these 3 patients from Nepal were also admitted.

Patients from all over the Northeast region and other parts of the country have been accessing the services of the institute. Patients from Nepal have also sought treatment at the hospital. # **SUPPORTIVE SERVICES:**

#### **REHABILITATION SERVICES**

#### Introduction:

Rehabilitation services are organised by the Centre for Rehabilitation Sciences (CRS) from the year 2010. It was started as a day care centre by the Department of Psychiatric Social Work in 2004. Inpatients/Outpatients of LGBRIMH are the beneficiaries of the Rehabilitation services provided by the Institute. It has five units namely, Physiotherapy Unit, Speech therapy Unit Occupational/Vocational Therapy Unit, Special Education Unit and Wellness centre.

The rehabilitation services of the institute currently comprises of occupational therapy unit, physiotherapy unit, speech therapy unit, Special education (for the persons who are intellectually challenged) unit and Wellness center unit. Each of them is summarized below:-

## Occupational Therapy:

Occupational therapy unit has tailoring and embroidery lab, weaving lab, tailoring lab, knitting and stitching lab, art & craft lab, wood & bamboo work lab, gardening unit and literary activities unit. Clinical rehabilitation includes the following services – rehabilitation needs assessment and counseling, vocational counseling, psycho-education, behavioral intervention, supportive, self-oriented interventions and group

interaction sessions. Seven exhibitions of products of Rehabilitation center was organized by the center. A total of 2584 patients were benefitted under this unit by way of gaining skills in socially productive work and 425 number of pediatric patients were benefitted from occupational therapy services.

## **Physiotherapy:**

This unit was established to cater to the needs of the patients loco-motor disabilities. It focuses on the science of movement and helps people to restore, maintain and maximize their physical strengths, function and motion. The underlying physical issues are explored and intervened to enhance overall well being. Services of this unit include Pediatric rehabilitation, Neurological rehabilitation, Musculo-skeletal and Orthopedic rehabilitation, Pain management and Weight reduction programme. In the current session, a total of **7980** patients were benefitted under this unit.

## New equipments installed-

- i) High power LASER therapy
- ii) Radial Shock Wave Therapy Unit
- iii) Cryotherapy unit
- iv) Balance Board
- v) EMG Biofeedback

## **Speech Therapy:**

This unit was established to cater to the needs of the patients with Speech and Language disorders. It focuses on the speech and language communication and helps people to restore, oral articulatory speech functions and motion of articulators, voice disorders, delayed speech milestones and hearing impairment post amplification or surgery.

In the current session, a total of 745 patients were benefitted under this unit.

## **Special Education:**

This Unit is engaged in facilitating various activities for the persons with intellectual challenges, which includes ADL skill, communication /language skill, social behavior skill, functional academic skills and pre vocational /vocational training. A total of 3741 people who are intellectually challenged have benefitted under this unit.

## **Wellness centre:**

Wellness centre was established with the objective to promote positive health in an individual and to enhance quality of life and sense of well being. The wellness center has four sections:

- 1. Cardio-vascular Training
- 2. Strength Building
- 3. Endurance Training
- 4. Yoga Service

#### **CENTRAL LIBRARY:**

The library of an institute plays a vital role in enhancing the quality of academic and research activities. The Central Library was started in 1999 to meet the scholastic needs of students and faculty. It is an essential asset for the institute. It caters to the academic needs of the faculty, students and other staff. Specialized collections of books and journals are available in Psychiatry, Clinical Psychology, Psychiatric Nursing, Psychiatric Social Work and allied health disciplines. In 2018 the Central Library shifted to the New Academic Block Ground and First Floor. In addition to this, books of basic medical sciences are also available in the library. The collection includes nearly 33536 books, educational DVDs and a range of reference and office rule books, thesis and dissertations. It subscribes 55 print journals, 43 online journals. The institute is currently subscribing one online medical resource APA online database and also a member of ERMED- India consortium which is run by National Medical Library, New Delhi, through which the users can access more than 243 online journals.

The following services are available for the benefit of students, faculty and employees of the Institute, who are entitled to make use of the library facilities:

- Circulation Service
- Reference Service
- Access of scholarly literature: journals, online journals, back volume journals, books, thesis / dissertation
- Photocopy and printing service
- Access to high speed internet connectivity / Wi-Fi system in reading room.

In addition to the Central Library, there is also one library in the indoor section of the institute, which is equipped with daily newspapers and other books in the local language.

Besides this all the five departments i.e. Psychiatry, Clinical Psychology, Psychiatric Nursing, Psychiatric Social Work have their own departmental libraries which can be accessed by students.

#### **MEDICAL RECORD DEPARTMENT:**

In the year 1998 the Medical Record Department (MRD) was established at OPD for the management and maintenance of patients' records in a standardized manner to protect patient confidentiality. It is one of the primary supportive departments of the institute. Presently, the department has a Medical Record Officer, a Medical Record Technician and a team of assistants for smooth functioning of the department. It has computerized record keeping system for maintenance of patient's records for patient care and research activities. The department functions in co-ordination with the academic and other departments of the institute. The department also assists in the medico-legal cases by providing the information to the institutional authority whenever required.

The registration of patients is done with the support of the software developed by the department. The section also issues the medical fitness certificate and treatment certificate to the patients after being examined by a medical Board. The department was starting the e-hospital project from this session. A total of 47 Treatment Certificates and 37 Fitness Certificates were issued during the session.

#### **PHARMACY:**

Pharmacy services are located both in Out-Patient Department and Indoor section of the institute. The Central Medical Store located at the Indoor acts as the central pharmacy for the inpatients and out-patients. The Pharmacy located at Out-Patient Department dispenses medicines to all OPD patients free of cost and maintains daily dispensing register of drugs. The current staff position includes a Senior Pharmacist and a Pharmacist.

The pharmacy also caters to the emergency services and arranges free medicines for community extension clinics and other outreach services. A total of 11,709,545 medicines were distributed to the patients in OPD free of cost.

#### **ANAESTHESIOLOGY UNIT:**

The Anesthesiology Unit has been serving as a supporting unit of psychiatry since its setting up in 2003 in the Indoor section after the introduction of the computerized Electro-Convulsive Therapy. The Unit carries out

the task of providing ECT to patients under the supervision of psychiatrists. ECT is administered to patients after informed consent from the guardian of patients. On the day of ECT, a pre-ECT check up is carried out, followed by a post ECT check up in the recovery room.

During the period under report, a total of 1924 Modified ECT sessions were administered. 1254 male and 670 female patients received ECTs during this session.

In addition to the patient care services, the department also undertakes theory classes and demonstration sessions to the post graduate and diploma students of the institute as well as the visiting medical students and professionals from other academic institutions. The Unit is projected to become a full-fledged Anesthesiology Department in the future after the setting up of departments of neurosurgery.

#### **ENGINEERING CELL:**

The Engineering Cell of the Institute consists of the Civil Engineering and Electrical Engineering Units. The Engineering Cell is in charge of all construction and maintenance works i.e. buildings, roads, electrification as well as repairing works in the institute. The current staff position includes one Project Engineer, one Junior Engineer (Civil), one Junior Engineer (Electrical), Plumber, Electricians and other Auxiliary Staff.

#### **Infrastructure Development:**

The up-gradation project for development of infrastructure facilities of the institute is still under progress. The institute has engaged HSCC (India) Ltd. (A Govt. of India Enterprise), E-6 (A-Sector-1, Noida), as consultant for undertaking construction work at LGBRIMH. The consultant agency divided the construction work in three packages. Package – I consists of construction of the main hospital building and outpatient department with all modern facilities. Package –II involves construction of academic block, residential quarters, junior residential hostel, senior residential hostel, cafeteria building, Director's Residence, electric substation, STP, Incinerator and other external services in the hospital campus. Package – III involves construction of Auditorium and Nurses Hostel. The construction work of all the packages is completed. It is supervised by a Building Committee.

## **ESTABLISHMENT SECTION:**

This section carries out all administrative related works. Its main task comprises of recruitment, retirement and attendance of staff, leave related matters and disciplinary actions related to staff. In addition to it, the section carries out ministry related correspondence, court related work etc. The current staff position includes one Administrative Officer, two Assistant Administrative Officers and other supporting staff. A total of 13 new regular personnel were recruited and 8 Personnel retired in this session.

#### **PUBLICATION CELL:**

The full fledged Information and Publication Section was introduced in the year 2007 to facilitate information flow within and outside the organization and to undertake publication works in the sphere of mental health. The Section has been publishing the annual reports, booklets, information brochures, educational materials, publicity pamphlets, etc. Annual Reports are published in both English and Hindi languages. The Section is also engaged in the documentation and photography works of the institute. The department provides all updates i.e. publication of advertisement, tender notification, admission notification, declaration of results etc. in the institute website. The cell also assists and prepares online report of All India Survey of Higher Education under the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India and submits the same.

The Cell collects and prepares answer of the parliamentary questions of Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha as desired by the Ministry. All advertisements of the institute published in the newspapers are sending through this cell.

#### **NAZARAT SECTION:**

Procurement of all items of the institute including medicine, dietary, hygiene, stationary and computer items are through this section. In addition to it, this branch also looks after the maintenance of vehicles. The section is headed by I/c Nazarat and supported by other supporting staff.

#### **ACCOUNT AND FINANCE SECTION:**

The Accounts and Finance Section is engaged in providing the services pertaining to Finance and maintenance of accounts of the Institute. The main functions of the department comprise of preparation of yearly budget, submission of annual audited report of expenditure to ministry and other financial related works of the Institute. The section implemented Public Financial Management System (PFMS) system for payment to vendors. The current staff position includes Chief Finance and Accounts Officer and, Accounts Officer and Accountants supported by other supporting staff.

#### **CANTEEN:**

A canteen is situated in the OPD complex for patients and guardian visiting the OPD. A new cafeteria is also open near Academic Block for Students, visitors and staff.

#### **DIETETICS:**

Keeping in view of the health condition of the in-patients, balanced diet is provided so that they do not lack in nutrition. Along with the meal, they are also provided fruits and other necessary dietary supplements. Needs of the patients with special diets are also taken care of. In the last session i.e. 2018-19 a total of 78 patients get special diet.

#### **HOSTEL:**

The Institute provides hostel accommodations for students. At present there are 2 hostels to accommodate 100 boarders including clinical staff.

The administration of these hostels is carried out under the Hostel Superintendent who is aided by 2 Hostel Wardens and Mess Monitors. There is also a hostel management committee that is entrusted with the responsibility of discipline and maintenance in the hostels.

Each of the hostels has telephone and television with cable connection. Recreational facilities like Table Tennis and Badminton are available. The hostels have rules and regulations including anti-ragging rules that apply to all the boarders for maintenance of discipline and good conduct.

#### **COMPUTER FACILITIES:**

The Institute has grown significantly in terms of departments and academic programmes as well as infrastructure. In order to enhance efficient documentation as well as to reduce the time taken for processing work, computer facilities are provided for staff and faculty. All staff and faculty rooms are equipped with sufficient computers to carry out their everyday jobs. Internet facility is provided throughout the campus using LAN and wireless LAN connections. The institute is connected to high speed NKN connectivity. A technician extends his help for troubleshooting of problems. All the computer facilities in the Institute are provided under the supervision of Medical Record Officer (MRO).

#### **PUBLIC GRIEVANCE:**

The institute has implemented the Sevottam model that was developed with the objective of improving the quality of public service delivery in the country. The model comprises of three components. The first

component requires effective charter implementation, the second requires adequate grievance redressal system, and the third requires excellence in service delivery.

The Citizen's Charter is a written declaration by a government department that highlights the standards of service which it delivers. The institute has its own charter that enables users to know what services are available in the institute, the quality of services they are entitled to and the means through which complaints regarding denial or poor quality of services will be redressed.

The institute has its own grievance redressal system. All verbal grievances are managed on the spot of the delivery of care. In the OPD, the MRO and in the Indoor, the Matron resolves the issue in consultation with the in-charges. Every grievance is duly acknowledged with proper grievance number and expected time of redressal. The complaints should be accompanied with proper name and address of the aggrieved person. If the matter is not resolved then it is referred to the Medical Superintendent who tries to resolve it within 30 days of referral.

The Director is the next appellate authority if the grievance is not resolved. A public task force and a steering committee exist at the apex level at the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Govt. of India, New Delhi for implementation of the Sevottam complaint Grievances Redressal Mechanism.

The institute also provides responses to RTI applications regularly. The institute is optimistic that accomplishment of these tasks will lead to the achievement of Sevottam.

#### **STORE:**

The store maintains everything required for the full functioning of the institute. It provides uninterrupted services to the various user departments. It has different sections, viz. - medicines, stationary, dietetics, hygiene, electrical section and condemned materials. The store is in the process of being computerized to facilitate enhanced services.

#### **EMERGENCY SERVICES:**

The Institute provides medical services, geared to meet any emergency, from 2 p.m. to 9 a.m. The patients in need of acute care and without prior appointment are given adequate treatment without delay.

#### LINEN AND LAUNDRY:

Linen and laundry service is an integral part of the institute to ensure supply of good, clean and fresh linen to patients and prevent cross infections between patients. To maintain health and hygiene of the patients, the

uniforms of the patients and the bed linen are washed every day. Currently the hospital clothes are laundered manually. The institute plans to upgrade this facility and introduce commercial mechanized laundry machines in the future.

#### **SANITATION:**

Sanitation can go a long way towards mitigating hospital infection. Incineration method is employed for disposal of hospital waste. The Institute aims to create a totally germ-free atmosphere. Disinfection of urinals and bathrooms are done on a regular basis under the supervision of a sanitary supervisor.

#### **SECURITY:**

Keeping in view of the variety of people who make up the hospital environment – patients, staff, physicians, visitors, students and so on – hospital security poses a significant challenge. As such security guards are placed at key areas to check on unauthorized entry and prevent unforeseen incidents. To provide a safer environment, the security guards keep a track of all the visitors who enter the institute's campus.

#### LITIGATIONS:

The institute handles administration and patients-related litigations. The institute has a legal adviser who furnishes advice on all legal issues and addresses the same. Psychiatrists of this institute are also assisting the court of law as expert witnesses as and when summoned.

#### **WASTE DISPOSAL:**

Bio-medical waste (BMW) means involves any solid, fluid or liquid waste, including its container and any intermediate product, which is generated during its diagnosis, treatment or immunization of human beings or animals, in research pertaining thereto, or in the production or testing of biological and the animal waste from slaughter houses or any other like establishments. The waste produced in the course of health care activities carries a higher potential for infection and injury than any other type of waste. About 85% of hospital wastes are non-hazardous, whereas 10% are infectious and 5% are non-infectious but they are included in hazardous wastes. Management, handling and treatment of biomedical waste in our Institute are done as per bio-medical waste rules, 1998. The capacity of Incinerator used for waste disposal is 10-12 kg/hr.

# **OUTREACH EXTENSION SERVICE**

#### Introduction:

In mental health community outreach extension service is one of the major activities provided by the institute. The objective of this service is to make mental health services more accessible to the community. Mental health experts visit the rural areas to provide these services. Medicines and psychosocial services are provided free of cost. It is primarily meant for the underprivileged and vulnerable segments of the society who have limited access to mental health services. All the departments of the institute collaborate to conduct the clinics regularly. Teams from Psychiatry and Psychiatric Nursing Department including supporting staff provide regular services. The ongoing regular outreach services are—

- 1. Sootea Extension Clinic: Psychiatric extension service at Sootea PHC was started in 2007 as part of the NMHP research project. It is located at a distance of 60 Km away from the institute. This clinic is held regularly on the second Thursday of every month. Attached to this centre are also four Self-Help Groups of care-givers in three villages of the Sootea Block. This community service has also accommodated another service on the fourth Thursday of every month to cater to the patients of an extension service earlier held at Biswanath Chariali Civil Hospital from the year 2001 to 2011. Due to inadequate space availability the service was shifted to the Sootea P.H.C.
- **2. Jakhalabanda Extension Clinic:** The extension clinic at the Community Health Centre (CHC), Jakhalabanda, Nagaon was started in 19<sup>th</sup> February, 2011. It is about 40 Km away from the Institute. The clinic is scheduled on third Saturday of every month.
- 3. Missionary of Charity Extension Clinic: This service was started in 2007 at the Missionary of Charity, Tezpur, about 4 Km away from the Institute. It is scheduled on the first Wednesday of every month. Residents of the Missionary of Charity in need of medical services for mental illness and epilepsy are the chief beneficiaries of the clinic.

# **SPECIAL FUNCTIONARIES**

#### **Ethics Committee:**

The Ethics Committee was formed with the objective of facilitating patient care, research and education for faculty and students. The committee was formed in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Indian Council of Medical Research that mandates clearance of all proposals on biomedical research involving human participants by an appropriately constituted Institutional Ethics Committee (IEC). The Committee provides advice to the researchers on welfare and safety aspects of the research participants following assurance of scientific soundness of the research through the Scientific Review Committee. In this session one Ethics Committee meeting was held on 6.4.18 and 13.7.18

Power and functioning of the Ethics Committee:

- 1. To protect the dignity, rights and well being of patients and research participants.
- 2. To ensure universal ethical values and International Scientific Standard in terms of local community values and customs.
- 3. To assist in the development and education of a research community, this will be responsive to local health care requirements.

## **Scientific Advisory Committee:**

The Scientific Advisory Committee of LGBRIMH has been constituted from the various academic departments of Psychiatry, Psychiatric Social Work, Psychiatric Nursing and Clinical Psychology for research related activities. The thesis protocols of all P.G. students and all the research related works of Academic Departments are screened by this Committee to ensure scientific rigor in research as per the International Scientific Standards. In this session three Scientific Advisory Committee (SAC) meeting were held on 29.6.18 and 11.03.19 18 respectively.

The following research proposals numbering 27 were approved by the Scientific Advisory Committee (SAC) and the Ethics Committee (EC) of the Institute during the year 2018-19.

## **Parliamentary Questions:**

Parliamentary Questions are one of the important procedural devices that empower Members of the Parliament to elicit factual information from the Government on a matter of public interest. As an autonomous institute funded by the Govt. of India, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, the Institute provides the replies to the parliamentary questions from members of the Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha as forwarded by the Ministry. We receive the Parliamentary questions which are categorized as Starred, Unstarred and Short Notice Questions. In the session April, 2018 to March, 2019, the Institute provided answers to a total of 38 Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha Questions to the Ministry as desired.

## **Sexual Harassment:**

Under the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013, the Institute constituted a committee for redressal of such complaints raised by any female employee. No case of sexual harassment has been registered so far.

## **Anti Ragging:**

The institute has constituted an Anti Ragging Committee for the redressal of complaints of ragging raised by students. No complaints have been registered so far.

# **New Initiative**

#### Youth Mental Health Initiatives: Formation of Youth Wellness HUB:

A new centre called Youth Wellness HUB has recently started functioning at our campus. It is a dedicated centre for various activities geared towards promotion of mental health among college-youth as well as providing psychological care to distressed young people who hesitate to seek regular OPD services due to stigma and other barriers. A lot of hard work by a multi-disciplinary team has gone behind in the last 6 months to establish this centre.

#### **Precursor to Youth Wellness Hub:**

#### Month-long Observation of World Mental Health Day (Oct-Nov, 2018):

Our institute took up the cause of Young people's mental health in a big way and observed a month-long observation of World Mental Health Day last year in Oct-Nov where the theme was 'Young People and Mental Health in a Changing World'. We were able to generate a lot of buzz in and around the town by **organizing 16 activities** within a span of just one month and could **reach out to around 1500 people in the community** with the message that 'Mental Health is Funda-mental!'

#### Yuva-Mann-Meet Initiative:

A community outreach program specifically targeting the students of various colleges in and around Tezpur, called 'Yuva-Mann-Meet' was launched as part of the month-long program. Staff and trainees of Department of Clinical Psychology, LGBRIMH, which led this initiative, visited 5 different college campuses and conducted five half-day interactive sensitization seminars called 'Youth Dialogue' and spread the message of mental health among 569 college-youth. Alongside various youth-contests related to themes of mental health of college-youth were organized in these campuses to bring out their talents and creativity of the students. A total of 200 college youth in and around Tezpur took part in these fun-contests like Mobile-photography, poster-making, logo-designing, skit and slogan-writing- all around the theme of mental health issues pertaining to younger generation. The initiative was very well received by both the college students and college authorities.

#### Initiation of Youth Wellness HUB at LGBRIMH:

With the success of 'Yuva-Mann-Meet' initiative, the institute formally declared the establishment of Youth Wellness Hub. It is currently functioning from the Centre for Rehabilitation Sciences building as a temporary

location and is open on all Saturdays. Any young people who is psychologically distressed and seeking help or want to talk about mental health related issues, want to take part in brief group-discussions or workshops or creative performances on the broad theme of mental health, or simply cares of others mental health and want to volunteer their time and energy are most welcome to walk in the HUB. They can reach out to the HUB through WhatsApp or Facebook. The HUB functions in a youth-friendly manner with its advisory committee members from various institutes like Darrang College, Tezpur Law College, Tezpur University and our own institute as well as youth-members who all guide and help the centre chart out the path ahead. Recently our HUB participated in Assam Science Festival held at TU and put up more than 12 interactive exhibits through our student-volunteers, drawing over 1000 footfalls in its stall. The overwhelming positive response of the college-youth community at TU proved it beyond doubt that such a centre has been a long-due one! We look forward to college-going youth in/around Tezpur to make the best use of the services of this centre and be the change-agents themselves when it comes to mental health.

## Online Certificate Program on Mental Health MEET LGBRIMH: Digital Academy

Mental health care facilities and health professionals in the country is limited. As highlighted by the mental health systems assessment of National Mental Health Survey, Assam State Report, 2017, the ratio of health facilities in the state is around 0.10, and the number of health professionals is less than 1 per 100,000 populations. Limited availability of mental health professionals (psychiatrists, clinical psychologists, psychiatric social workers and psychiatric nurses) has been a significant barrier in providing mental health care services in the community. However, the survey also found that the general health workforce density (per 1,00,000 population) was found to be relatively better than the mental health workforce density.

Primary aim of the online certificate program is to facilitate health care providers gain knowledge about mental health and its disorders while delivering care for people with mental health conditions.

To combat this deficiency of trained human resources, many centres have initiated the use of digital technology. Giving impetus to the Digital India Initiative of the Government of India and to exponentially increase trained human resources in the field of mental health, the Mental health Education & E - Training [MEET] platform was launched on 28th August 2018 in LGBRIMH. This digital platform is for all healthcare professionals who are willing to provide primary care, upscale their knowledge and learn best practices in mental health. The current initiative is based on the implementation of training and mentoring health care providers involved in "best practices" of health care delivery in mental health across the state and North East India. Virtually connected health providers will be able to provide quality care for patients staying at rural and underserved part of the country.

An online certificate program has been started by the Institute as part of professional development program for Medical Officers, Nursing personnel, Psychologists and Social workers. Individual healthcare personnel can join their respective courses and train themselves in the field of mental health.

This online certificate program is a free of cost, blended training program combining both Synchronous and Asynchronous learning methods involving E-content, Video Lectures, Audio podeasts, Self-Assessment, Discussion Forums (including live discussions) and assignments. The participants of the program are provided learning materials in the form of PDF files, Powerpoint presentations, articles, etc. in digital format. Recorded video lectures are made available to the participants on select modules for a better understanding of the concept. These can be easily downloaded and watched for multiple times. Didactic lectures will also be provided through videoconferencing. During the course, each participant is given assignments for self-assessment and monitor their participation in the course. This is also used as one of the criteria for course completion. Through videoconferencing, live discussions are held every fortnightly for clarification of any doubts, question answers and discussion on the e-content.





## **World Mental Health Day:**

The 10<sup>th</sup> of October every year is observed as the World Mental Health Day, with a relevant mental health theme. This year's theme is "Young People and Mental Health in a Changing world"

LGB Regional Institute of Mental Health being a standalone institute with a regional mandate for mental health has been regularly observing the World Mental Health Day every year. This year LGBRIMH observed the World Mental Health Day with a month-long mental health programs within its campus and the community. World Mental Health Day programs commenced on the 8<sup>th</sup> October and concluded on the 10th of November 2018.

The inauguration of the program commenced on the 10<sup>th</sup> of October with the lighting of lamp by the dignitaries, Chief Guest Prof. Alak Kumar Buragohain, founder Head and Prof, Dept. of Molecular Biology and Bio Technology, Tezpur University and Guest of Honour Prof. S. 

**Accounting Convention:** 

The attested financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost concept and on cash

accounting basis.

Inventory Valuation:

Stores and spares are valued at cost or net realizable value, whichever is lower.

Fixed assets and depreciation:

Fixed assets are stated at written down value after providing depreciation at the rates prescribed under

Section 32 of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

The current construction cost of the new buildings has been incorporated in the books as Work In Progress

under the head "Creation of Capital Assets." Amount capitalized to Work in progress account as on 31st

March 2019 is `202,60,06,634/-.The Institute provides depreciation on applicable rates prescribed u/s 32 of

the Income Tax Act, 1961 under the WDV method.

**Government Grants:** 

Government grants are recognized on realization basis. Grants received for Capital Outlay have been

credited to Corpus Fund account and that received as General Fund are credited to Grants in aid a/c

shown under Income and Expenditure account. Interest on government grants, whether invested from

Capital Fund or General Fund, invested as fixed deposits have been shown as Interest Earned under

Income and Expenditure Account.

Retirement Benefits:

No provisions have been made for gratuity or leave encashment payable.

Interest Income:

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Income earned on regular savings account has been credited on receipt basis.

SCHEDULE 25: CONTINGENT LIABILIITES AND NOTES ON ACCOUNTS

Current Assets, Loans and Advances:

In the opinion of the management, current assets and loans and advances have a value on

realization in the ordinary course of business, at least to the aggregate amount shown in the

Balance Sheet.

Provision for taxation:

Provision for income tax is not made for the reason that the Institute is exempted from taxation

under section 10 of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

However, as amended in Budget 2014, any medical institution or hospital covered under Section

10(23C)(iiiae) or (via) of the Income Tax Act, 1961 shall be required to file its return of income u/s

139(4C) if its income (without giving exemption under section 10) exceeds the maximum amount

not chargeable to tax.

It is advisable that the Institute should take necessary steps to abide by the taxation laws.

3. Re-arrangement of previous year's figure:

The previous year's figures have been re-grouped, re-arranged and re-classified wherever

necessary to facilitate comparison with the current year's figures.

4. Bank Reconciliation Statement:

It has been observed that the Institute had not passed entries pertaining to bank charges and liquid

deposit fund. As a matter of internal control, it is advisable that the Institute should take

necessary steps to minimize the entries appearing in the bank reconciliation statement by

passing the regular entries appearing in the bank statement.

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#### 5. Books of accounts:

The Institute has maintained manual Cash Books which are then posted into an in-house developed computerized accounting software. Hence, the audit had been conducted by verifying transactions from various registers (computerized as well as manual).

#### 6. **Depreciation:**

The Institute, until thefinancial year 2013-14, had been charging depreciation at the rates prescribed under Schedule XIV of the Companies Act, 1956 under SLM Method. In the year 2014-15, the depreciation rates had been changed to applicable rates prescribed u/s 32 of the Income Tax Act, 1961 under WDV method. The same method of charging depreciation is being followed in the reporting year i.e. 2018-19 also.

Accounting Standard 6 "Depreciation" issued by the ICAI suggest that in case depreciation method is changed, depreciation should be recomputed applying the new method from the beginning of the useful life of the depreciable asset. The resultant surplus/ deficiency arising out of the recomputation is charged to profit and loss statement. Whereas the Institute have charged depreciation on the opening WDV of the asset as on 01.04.2014 at rates prescribed u/s 32 of the Income Tax Act, 1961.

It is advisable that the fixed asset register should be revised and the assets should be brought to their true and fair value.

#### 7. Accounting Convention:

As explained and according to the information provided to us since the Institute is following cash basis of accounting, it do not accounts for the asset on the date of its put to use. The same are

accounted for at the time of payment of the bill for purchase of asset. Moreover, fixed assets register is also updated on the date of payment of the asset.

### 8. Contingent Liabilities:

Contingent liability is estimated at `77,508/-,being Assam Entry Tax payable under Assam Entry Tax Act, 2008 @4% on vehicles purchased out of Assamin the F.Y.2015-16.

## 9. TDS:

- a) The Institute has deducted tax at source on payment made on account of Contractual Labour only on the Service Charges element. Whereas, in our opinion, u/s 194C or u/s 194J of the Income Tax Act, 1961, tax is required to be deducted on any sum paid/ payable to the payee i.e on the entire billed amount.
- b) The Institute has not complied with provisions of TDS in the below mentioned cases:

10. Goods and Service Tax:

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hief Finance & Accounts Officer

- a) As per Section 22 of the Goods and ServicesTax Act, 2017 every Supplier is liable to register itself under the aforesaid Act, if its Aggregate Turnover exceeds` 20,00,000 per annum.Further, Aggregate Turnover is defined to include all Taxable & Exempted supplies made by the supplier. In light of the above provisions, Scrap sold by the Institute for `5,35,000/-, Canteen Rent received for `78,240/- etc. are taxable events and hence, the Institute is liable
  - for Compulsory Registration, (other than as Tax Deductor), being the Supplier of Goods or Services or Both. The Institute has neither applied for registration nor have it discharged its liability to pay the due tax on the aforesaid transaction.
- b) The Institute has deducted GST at source only at the time of final bill of the contractor. It is in violation of Section 51 which provides for deduction at the time of payment or credit into the supplier's account. Hence, it is advisable to deduct GST at source on every RA Bill where the total value of contract exceeds `2,50,000/-.

## 11. Capital Work in Progress:

Additions made into building are accounted for into a single account 'Creation of Capital Assets' irrespective of the nature of assets bought for e.g furniture, machinery and building expenditure all are clubbed together. Further, as per explanation and information givento us, the assets were not put to use during the reporting year and hence depreciation is not provided although 100% work has been finished in a few cases.
